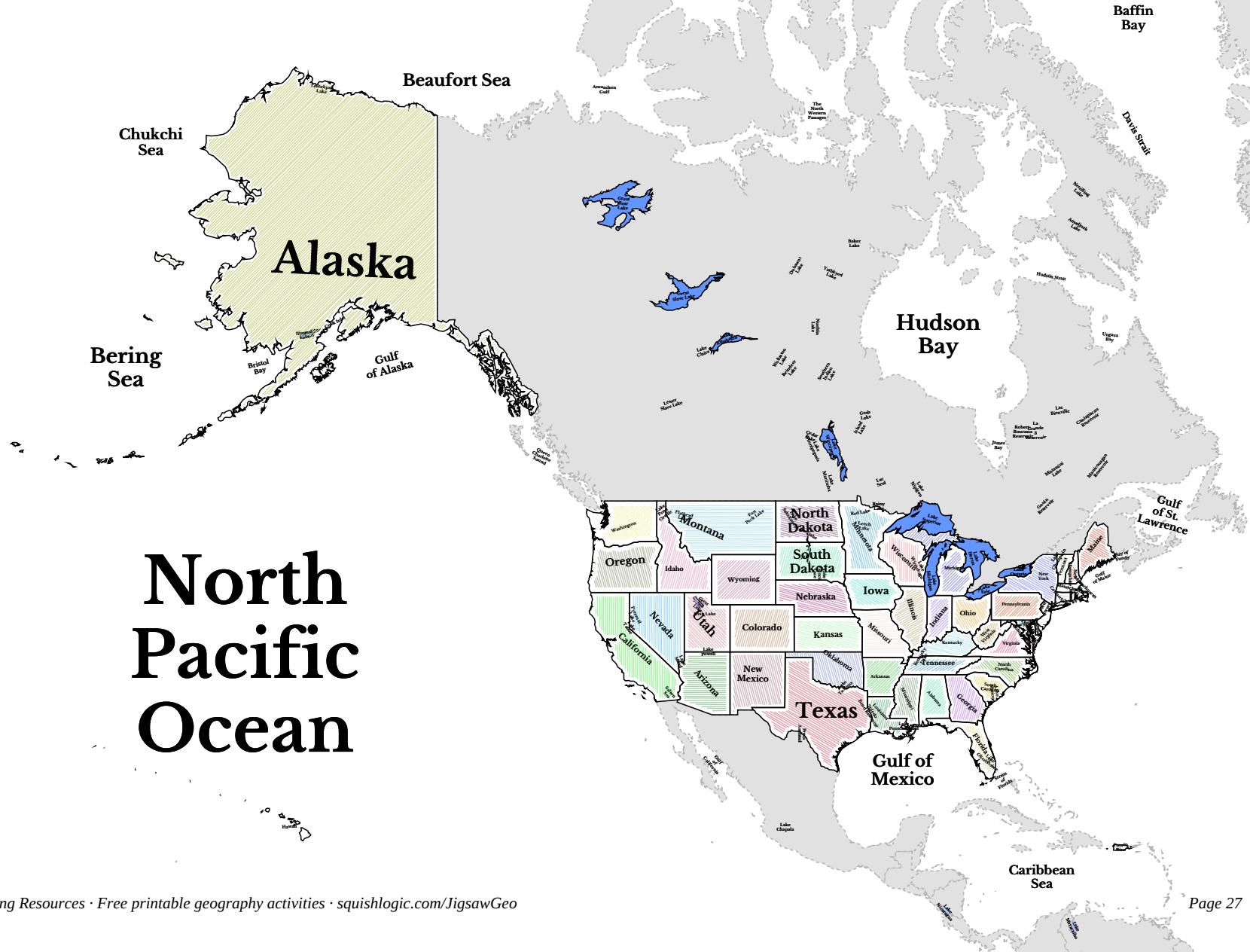

Outline Map of United States of America

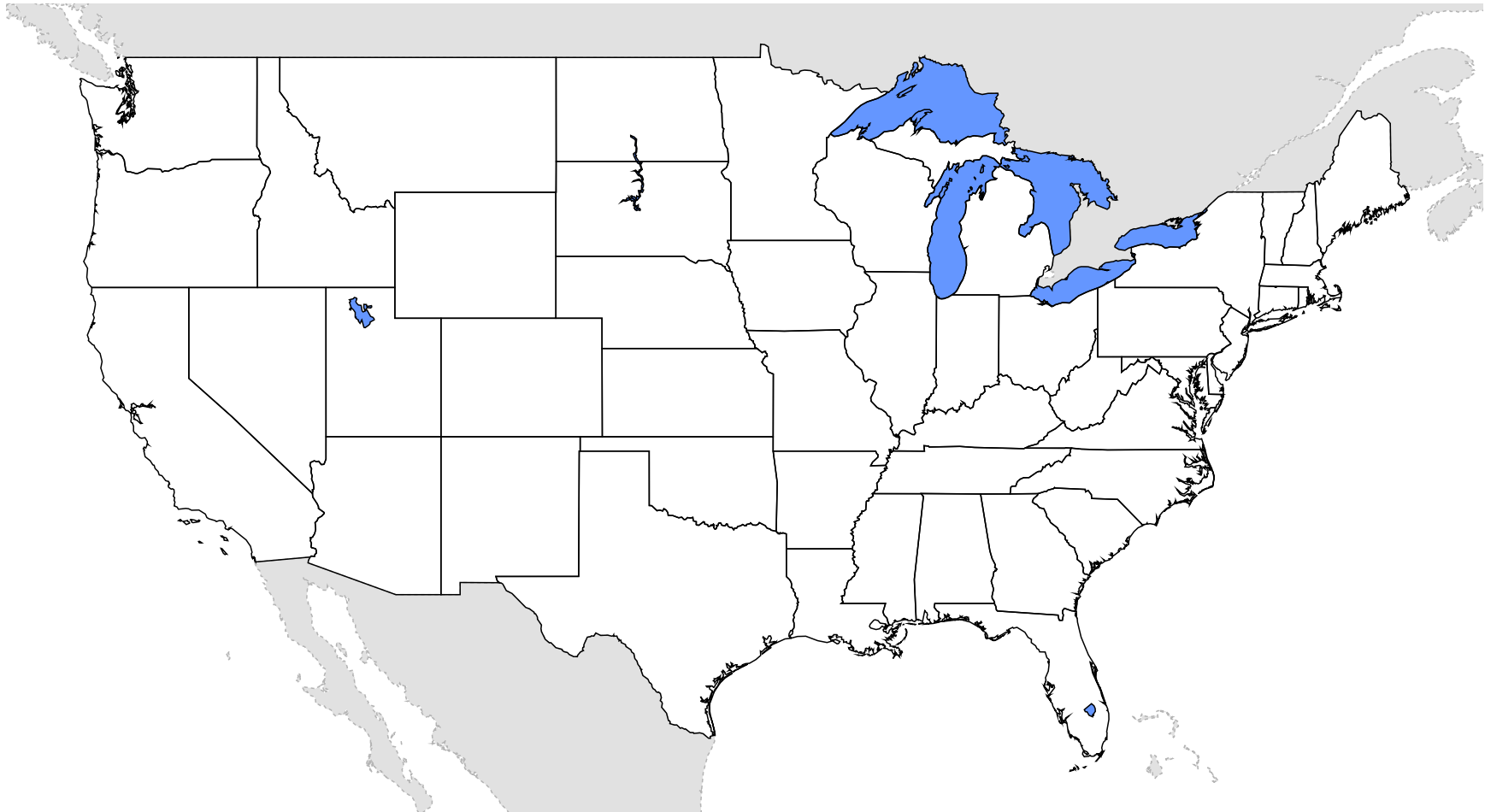

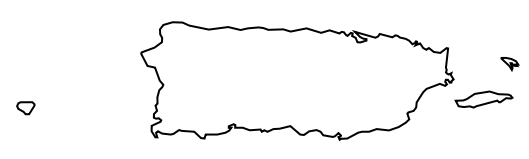

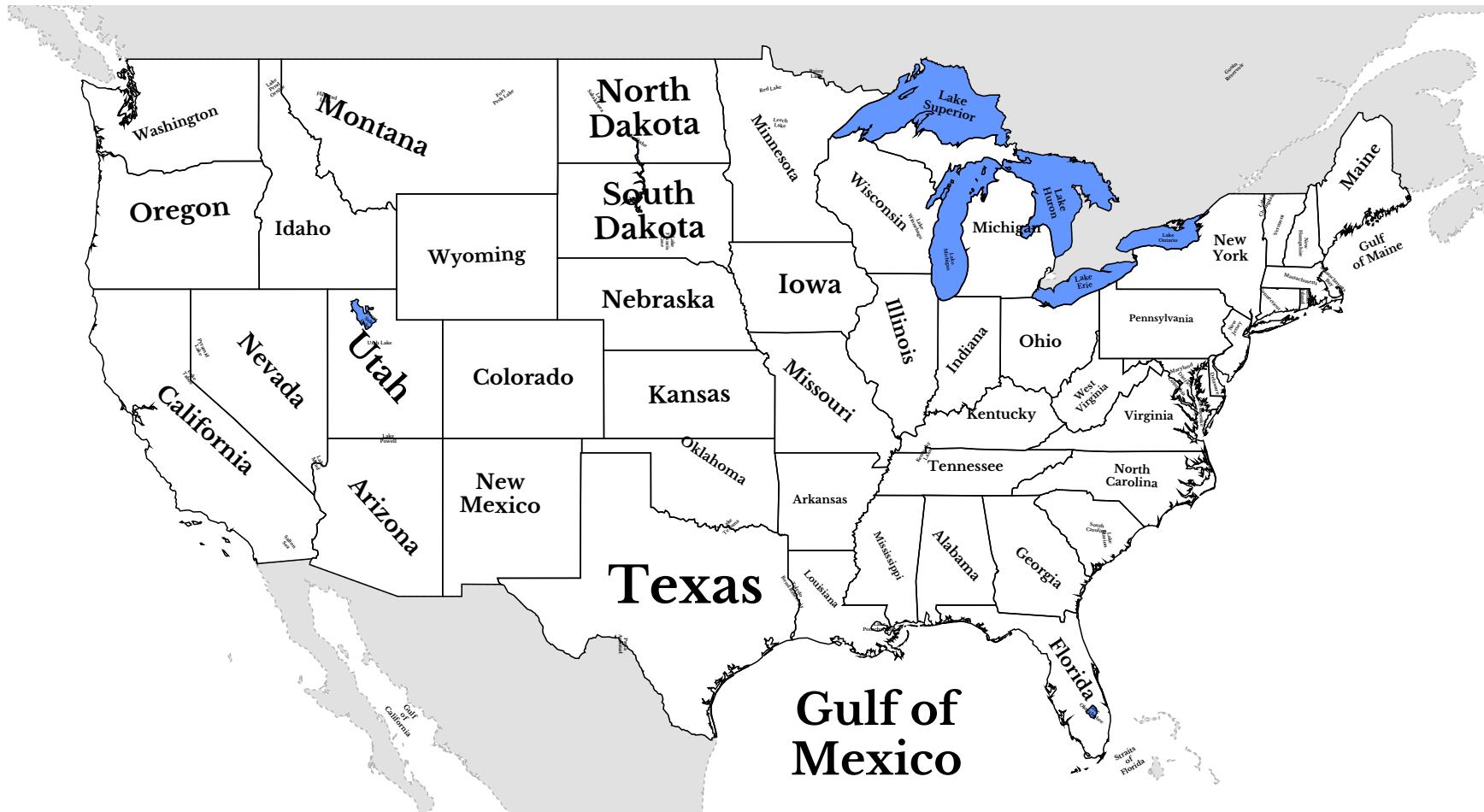

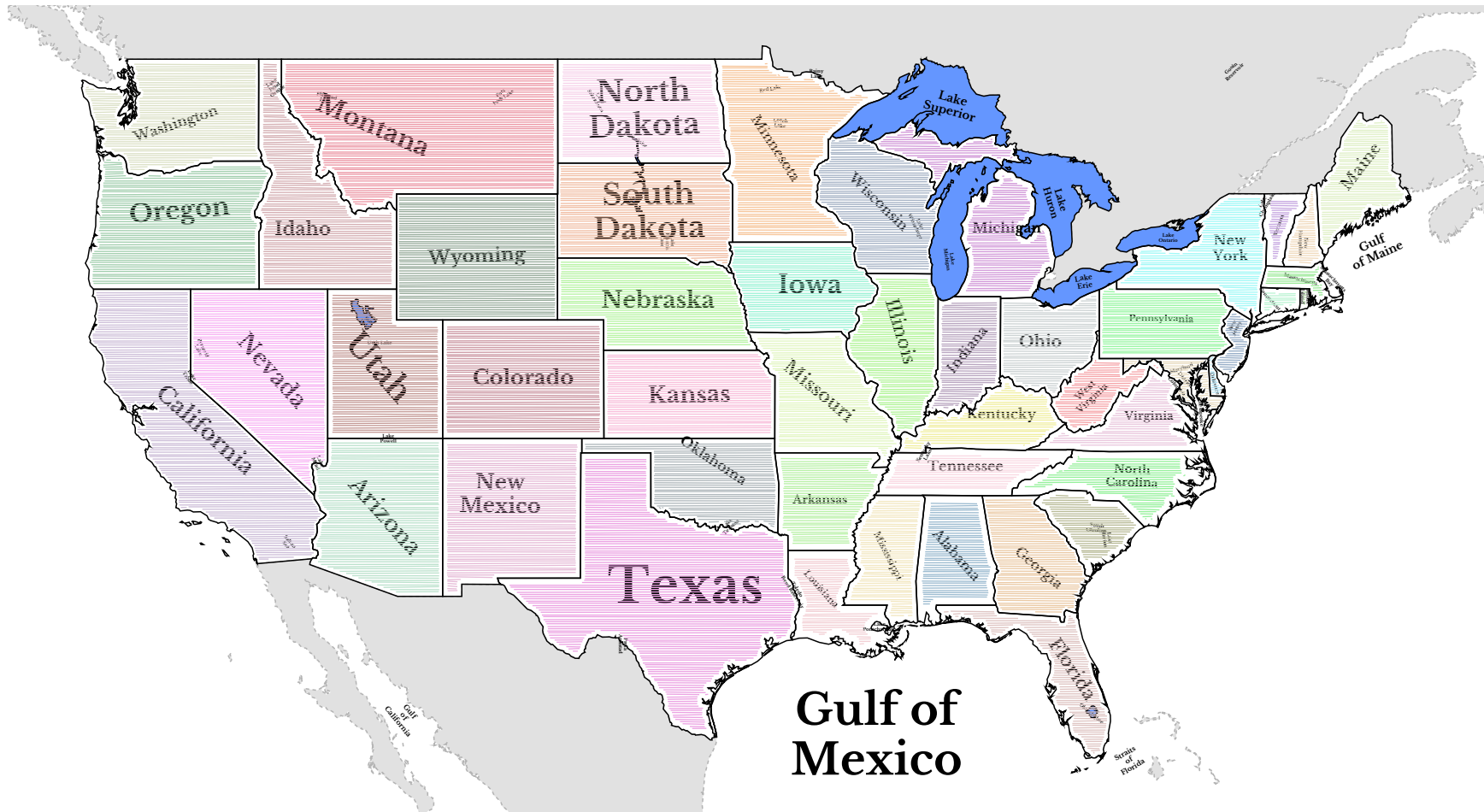

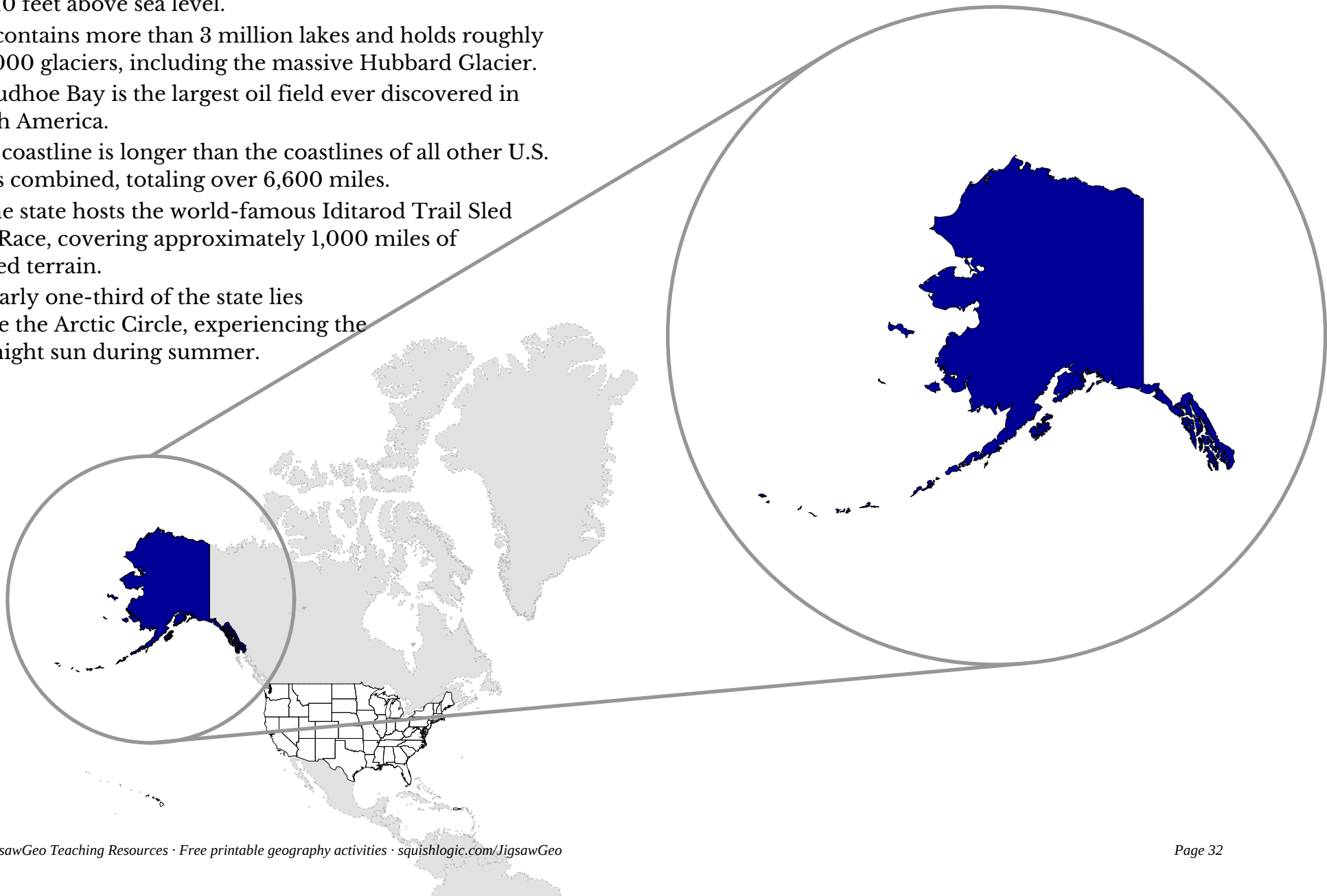
Fun Facts about Alabama

1. Home to the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, the state is where NASA developed the Saturn V rocket that powered the Moon missions.
2. It features over 1,300 miles of navigable inland waterways, the most of any U.S. state.
3. Birmingham was once the world's leading producer of iron and steel, earning it the nickname the Pittsburgh of the South.
4. The state is a global leader in the automotive industry, producing over 800,000 vehicles annually.
5. It houses the Tuskegee Institute, a historic landmark in African American education founded by Booker T. Washington.
6. The Mobile Bay area experiences a unique weather phenomenon called a jubilee, where sea life surges to the shallows.
7. Its state capital, Montgomery, is recognized as the birthplace of the modern Civil Rights Movement.



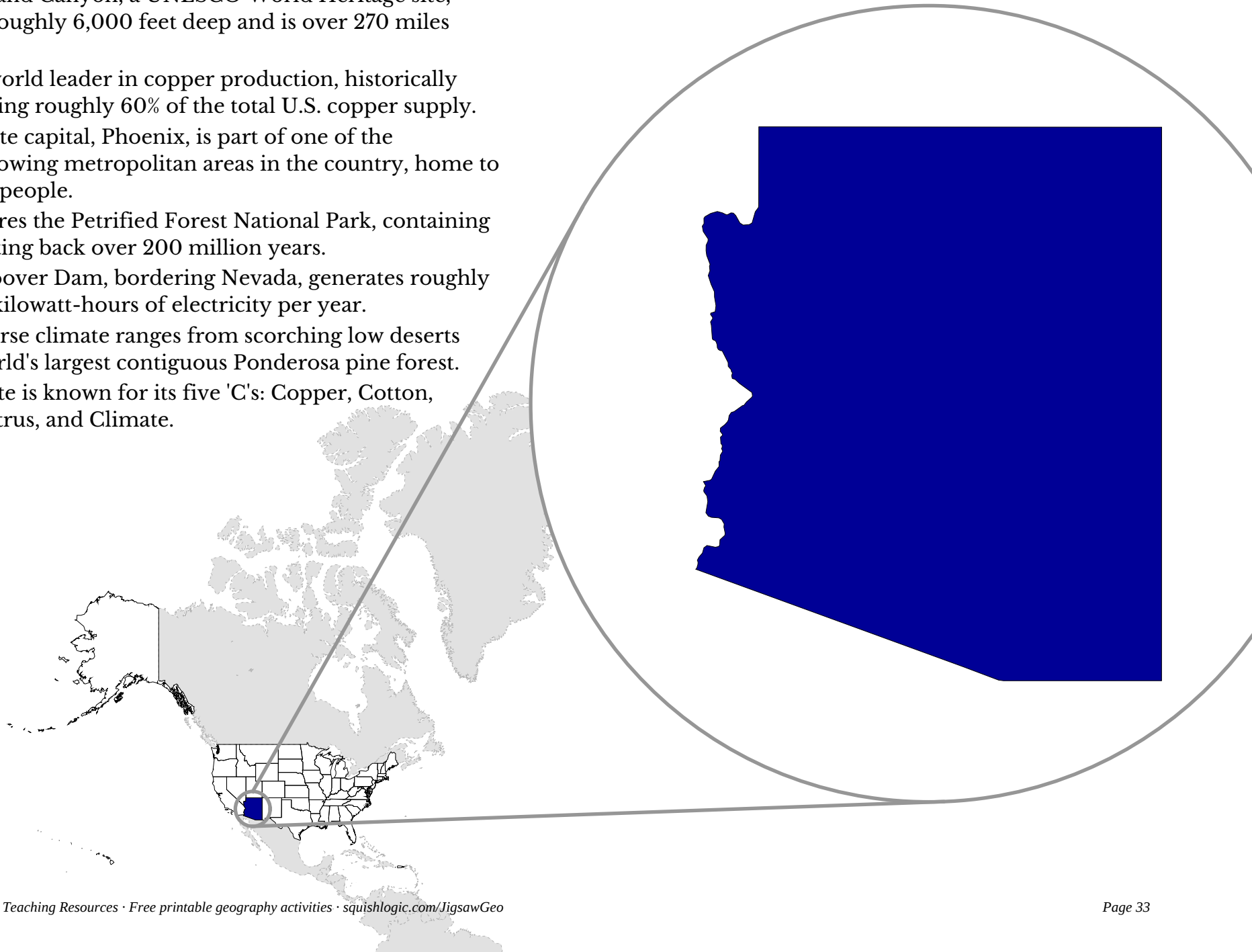
Fun Facts about Alaska

1. It is the largest U.S. state by area, spanning over 663,000 square miles—more than double the size of Texas.
2. Denali, the highest peak in North America, stands at 20,310 feet above sea level.

7. Nearly one-third of the state lies above the Arctic Circle, experiencing the midnight sun during summer.



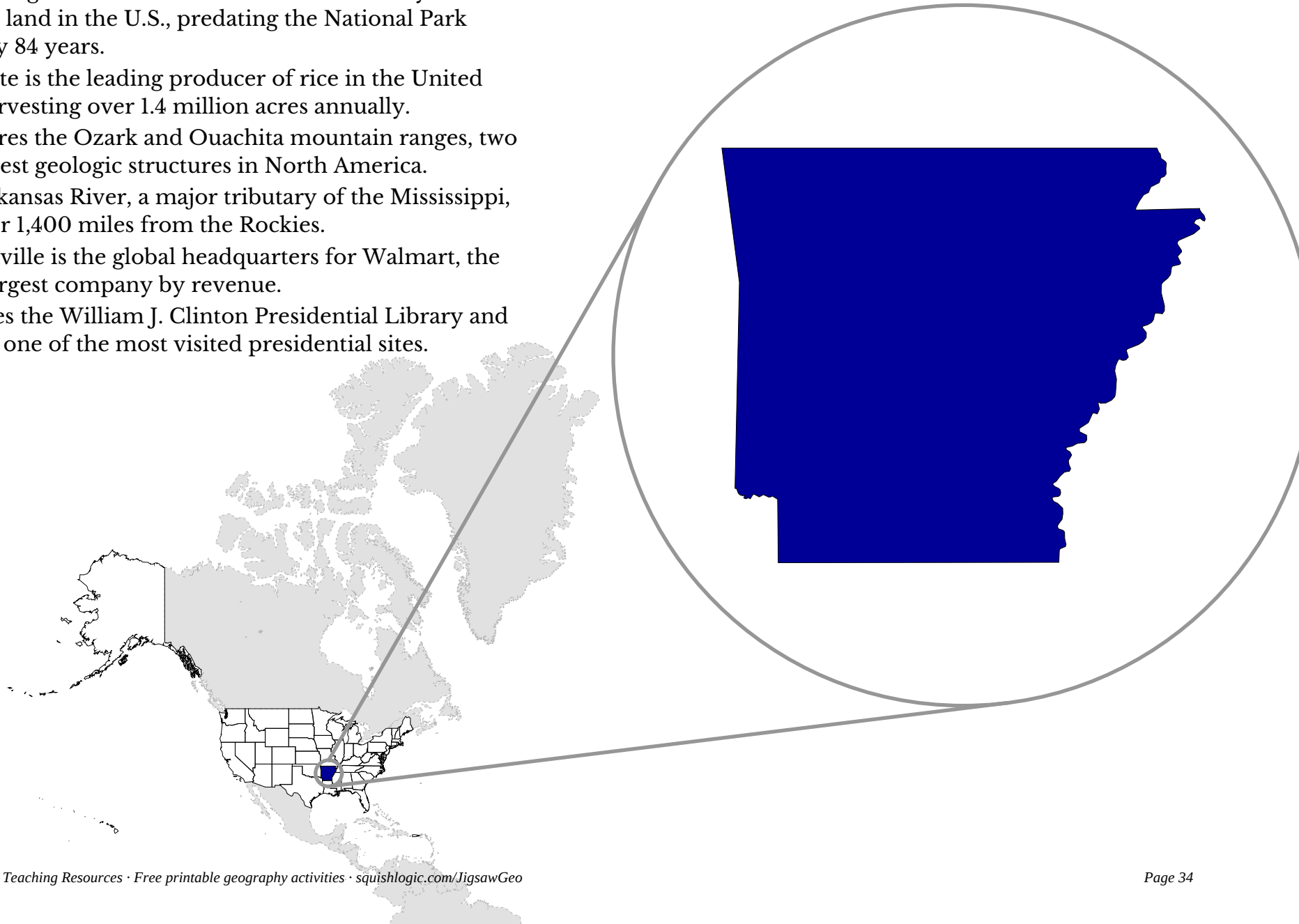
Fun Facts about Arizona

7. The state is known for its five 'C's: Copper, Cotton, Cattle, Citrus, and Climate.



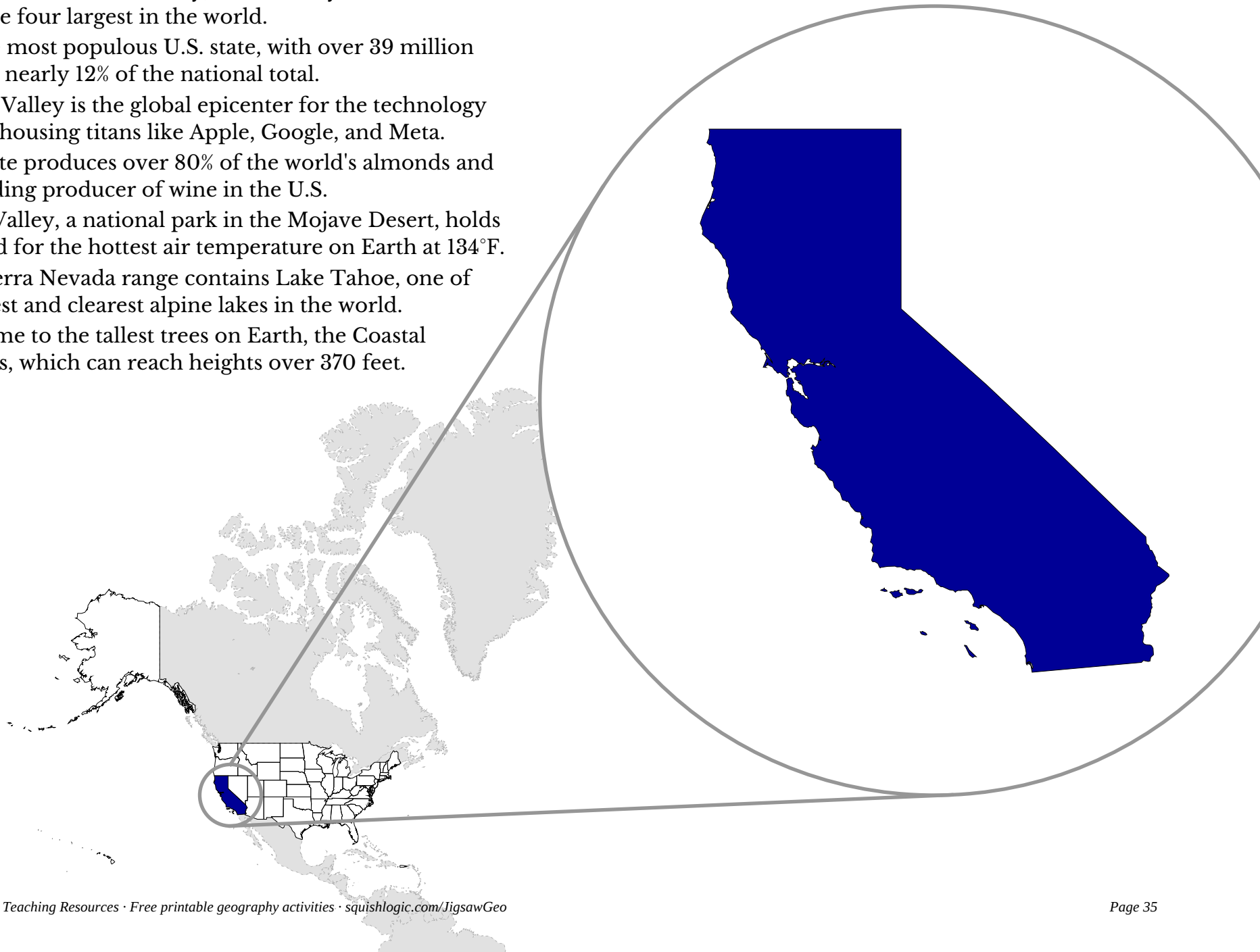

7. It houses the William J. Clinton Presidential Library and Museum, one of the most visited presidential sites.



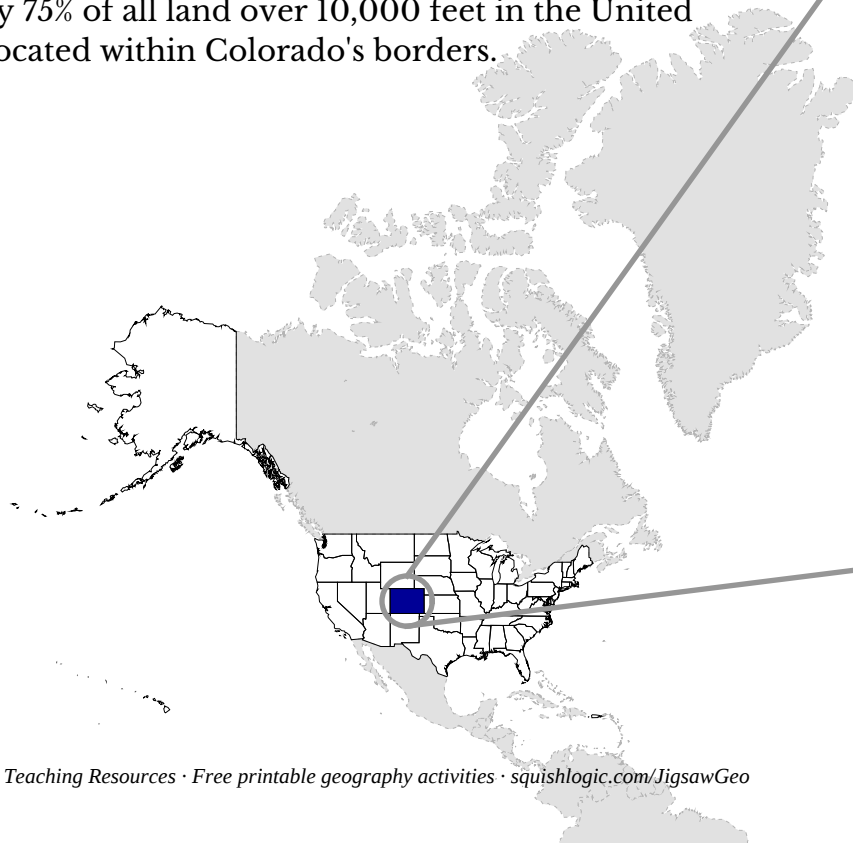

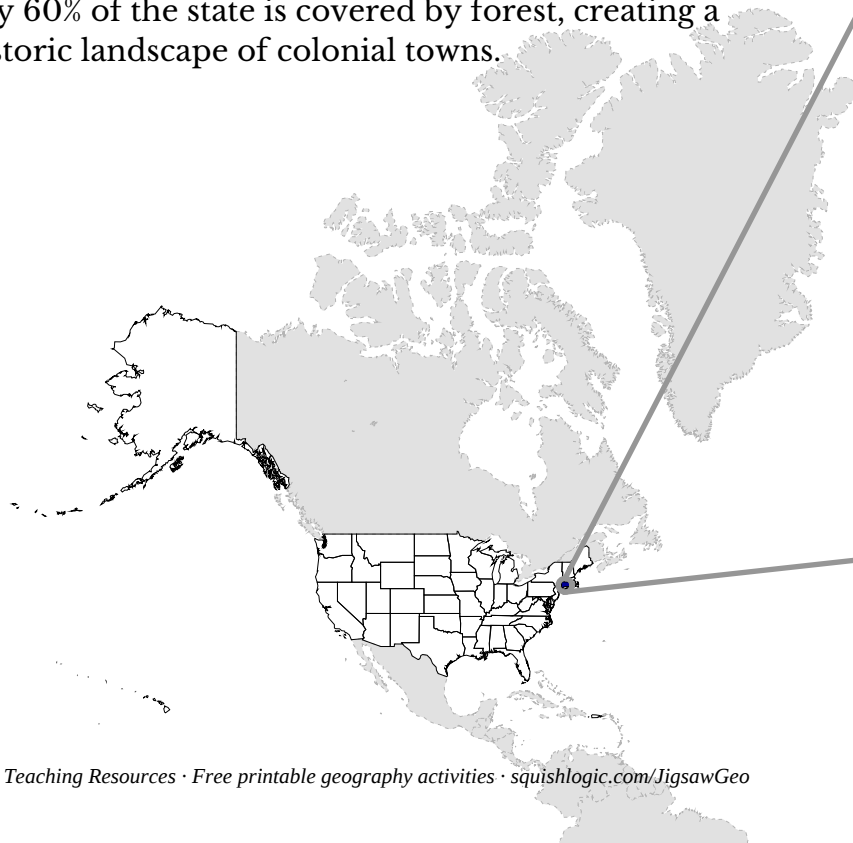

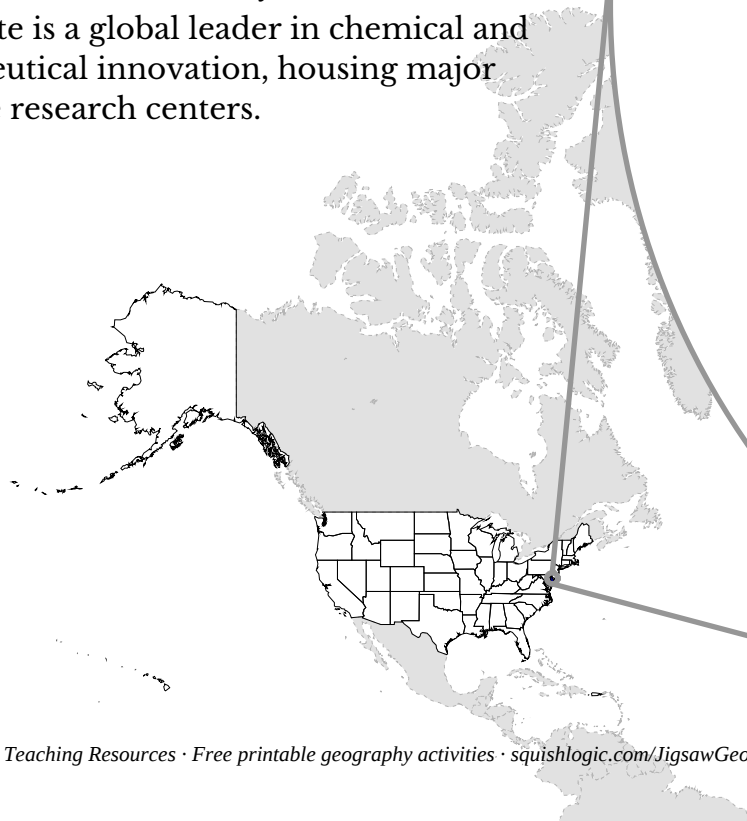

7. Roughly 60% of the state is covered by forest, creating a dense, historic landscape of colonial towns.



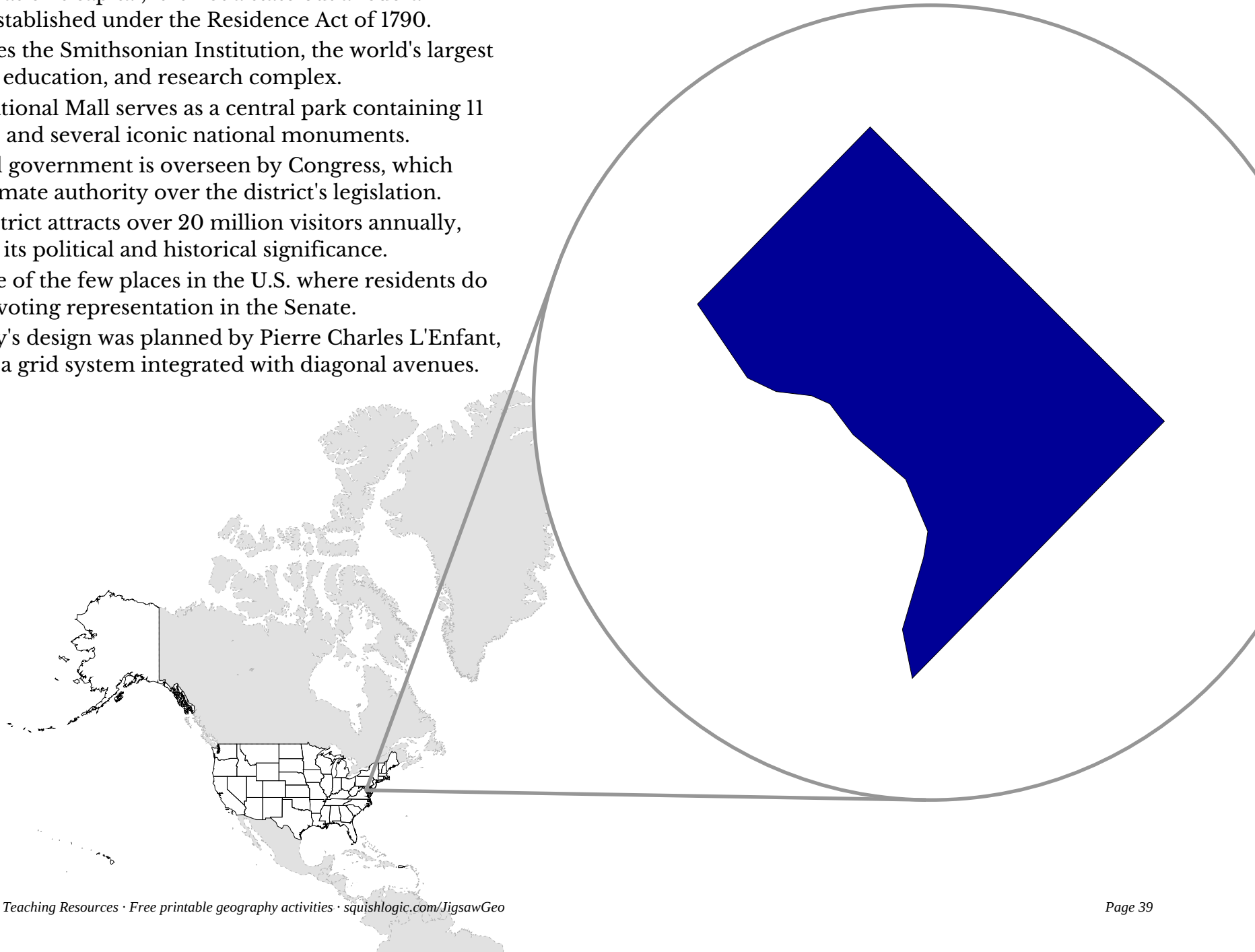
Fun Facts about Delaware

7. Roughly 40% of the state is covered by public forest land, providing extensive habitat for wildlife.



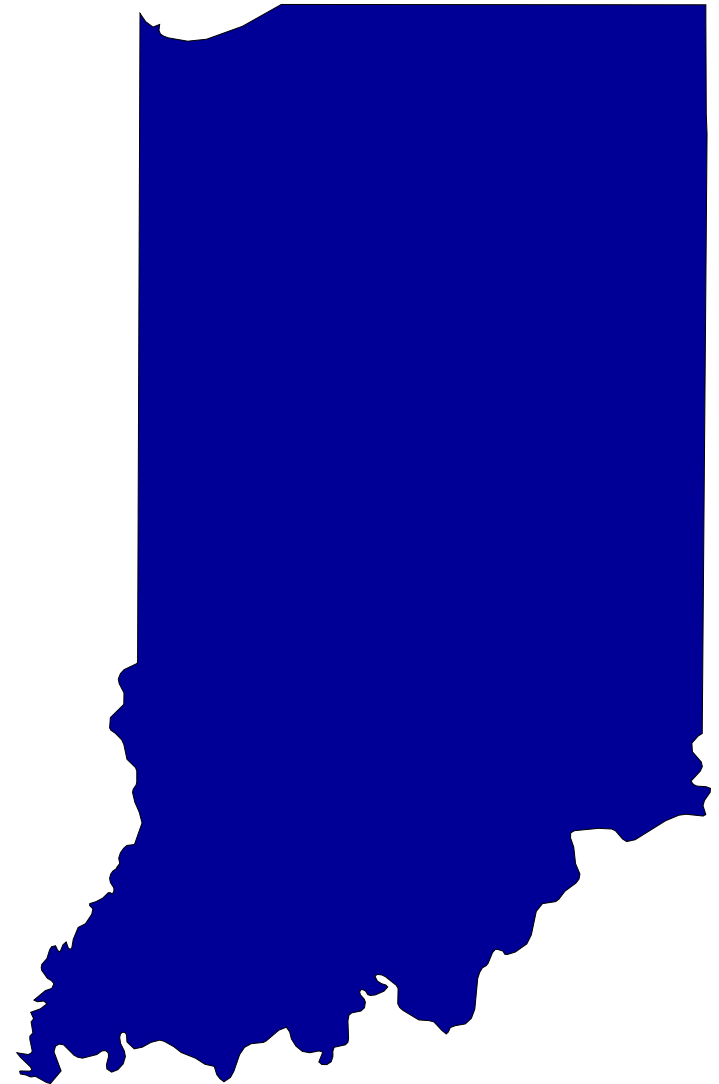
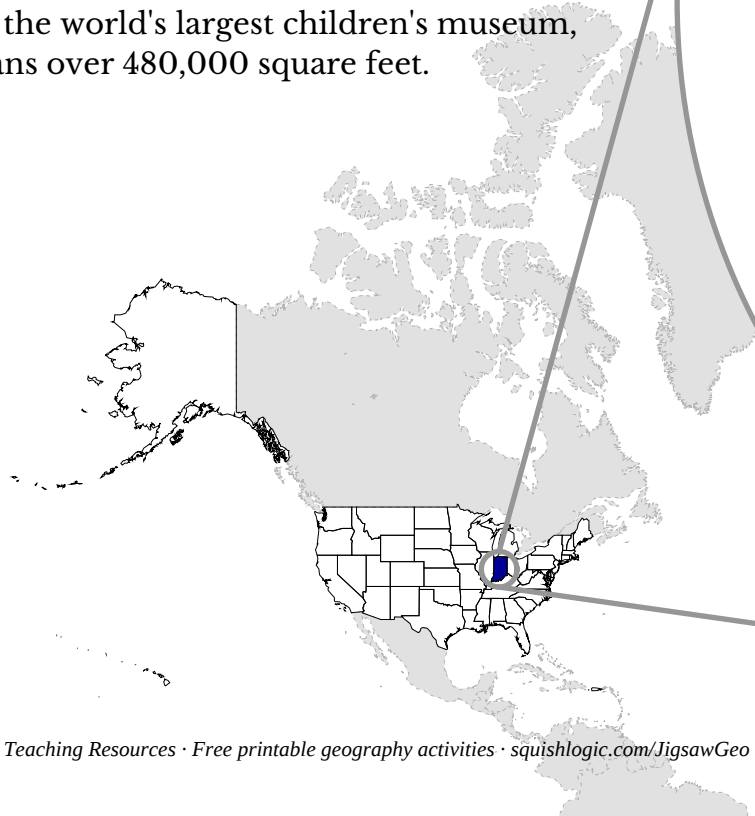

3rd to 4th Grade: Introduction to Spatial Patterns

At this stage, students are learning to read basic map keys and categorize information. The focus should be on simple datasets with only 3-4 categories (e.g., 'high,' 'medium,' 'low' population density).

Activity: Color-coding counties or states using a simple progression (e.g., light green to dark green).

Focus: Understanding that one color represents a range of numbers rather than a single value.

5th to 6th Grade: Data Grouping and Analysis

Students here can handle more complex datasets and are beginning to understand fractions and intervals. They are ready to create their own "bins" for data.

Activity: Deciding where to set the breaks for their data (e.g., 0-1,000, 1,001-5,000, 5,001+).

Focus: Recognizing how changing the intervals changes the "story" the map tells.

7th to 8th Grade and Above: Quantitative Accuracy

At the middle and high school levels, students should focus on the ethics and accuracy of data representation. They can incorporate more complex statistics like population per square mile rather than raw totals.

Activity: Using real-world census data to create choropleth maps using more sophisticated color gradients (sequential vs. diverging scales).

Focus: Analyzing how map projections and data normalization affect the viewer's perception.
